AMY SHARK IN MERREDIN

Amy Shark hit the stage on Sunday night, May 29th, 2022, to perform to a packed house at Cummins Theatre.

Merredin was the ninth stop on the West Australian leg of Amy's "See U Somewhere Australia" tour. The artist spoke at length about her desire to get out and see the regions, to tour to places outside of the major cities and how important that was for her. It's set to be a huge tour, with Amy visiting over forty towns and cities across the country.

The event was attended by close to 400 people, hailing from all over the region, some travelling almost 4 hours to see Amy perform in Cummins Theatre.

The show began at 7.30pm with support act, Dulcie, an all-girl indie pop trio hailing from Denmark, WA. The three young artists serenaded the crowd with their trademark ethereal sound and sweet harmonies.

At 8.30pm it was Amy's turn; she emerged onstage to a roaring crowd and began with hits "Everybody Rise" and "All Loved Up".

Throughout the night, the crowd was treated to personal anecdotes, and even some accent work, as the star explained she wanted the crowd to really get to know her.

The night was a smorgasbord of her best hits, and even included covers of "Simply the Best", and The Killers "Mr Brightside", which had the audience on their feet and dancing in the aisles.

Amy then thanked Merredin for coming out to the show and expressed her gratitude toward all those who support her and listen to her music.

The show ended with an encore of "Adore", "Love Songs Ain't For Us" and "I Said Hi".

The crowd was buzzing as they left the theatre, and some were even heard exclaiming that it was "the best night of their life!"

This was a night a lot of people won't forget anytime soon.



CYCLING ACROSS AUSTRALIA FOR POLIO AWARENESS

Tasmanian cyclists Phil and Joyce Ogden stopped for the night at Merredin recently. Their stay and sociable meal at the Senior Centre was organised by Heather Giles.

Phil and Joyce are riding their tandem bike from Perth to Adelaide, sponsored by Rotary District 9830, to raise funds for End Polio Now.

Polio is the common name for the virus infection poliomyelitis. Once greatly feared in Australia, polio is now unknown to many younger Australians but mostly remembered by older Australians who lived through the polio epidemics.

Recurrent epidemics of polio occurred in Australia from 1937 through to the 1950s. The

disease could potentially leave its victims paralysed, sometimes permanently. The last polio epidemic in Australia was in 1961- 62. A very effective mass vaccination program, begun in 1956, resulted in Australia being officially declared polio-free in 2000.

Polio, however, still exists in the world and the WHO aims to eradicate it by vaccination. Today, some people who survived polio in their childhood experience problems known as the 'late effects' of polio, or post-polio syndrome.

Merredin had many cases of polio, especially in children. Florence Mary Scanlan (a masseuse, similar now to a physiotherapist), was especially renowned for her work in

helping patients during Merredin's polio epidemic. For this work, and for much more that she did in the Merredin community, she was awarded the Order of the British Empire (OBE).



Tales from the Rails

Successful Railway Requests...

The importance of local groups and their success in lobbying for recognition and better services home, family community is well known within rural WA. One organisation that may well be described at the bedrock οf community engagement over the years is the Country Women's Association (CWA).

The following extract from an article published in The Western Mail on Thursday 14 November 1929 (p3) gives an insight into the activities centred around the Walgoolan community and in particular the efforts of the local branch of the CWA.

Walgoolan - On Saturday, October 12, this Branch held a successful Ball in aid of the Seaside Home. The popularity of the home, which will fill a long-felt want by the women of the bush, is steadily in measure here. The proceeds of the Ball should be а substantial contribution towards the upkeep (of the Seaside Home). This will be Walgoolan's second donation.

A letter was received from the Minister for Railways in reply to a request from the Walgoolan CWA, for a train to Merredin. He has authorised a change to be made in the new timetable, commencing on November 25 by which a train will leave Southern Cross about 5.30a.m.

on Thursdays, and pass through Walgoolan at 7.45, arriving at Merredin at 9 a.m., thus allowing people ample time board the Perth train.

From the History Room

The following snippets appeared in the local JUNE newspapers of the time.

12th, 1930: Towns & Warriors Football teams met at Hines Hill on Sunday last, when a very interesting match resulted in a victory for the visitors. The scores were Towns 9.15 to Warriors 9.9.

5th, 1952: What could be something unique in Merredin's history will take place on Thursday, June 12 when the new showroom and service station of Mr Tommy Lake at the corner of Fifth Street and Great Eastern Highway (now Barrack Street) will be officially opened.

1st, 1966: What is believed to be the lowest minimum temperature in the State for the 2nd time was experienced on Monday, when the temperature recorded at Merredin Research Station was 30.2 degrees (-1) with a ground temperature of 20.7 (-6.2).

24th, 1970: Rental charges at the

Merredin Recreation Ground will remain as previous, although there has been a slight change in Hall charges. The rent for the main hall, day use \$12.50, lesser hall day use \$6.00 plus \$10.00 for use of kitchen.

24th, 1970: Rental charges at the Merredin Caravan Park have been reduced from \$2 per day to \$1.50. One shire councillor said before the reduction he heard it was the dearest caravan park in the state.

24th, 1987: Narembeen's Frail Age Lodge has been named *Koolberrin Lodge*. The Lodge was named after an 18,000-acre property named Koolberrin which was the first farm in the Narembeen district. The Lodge is to be officially opened on August 7.

11th, 1997: China Southern Flying College has brought \$4,509,000 into Merredin, and 2 weeks ago, another 41 students arrived to learn to fly, injecting more money into the local economy. It has been 2 years since the College commenced operation.

Astronomy

WTF 2nd —15th JUNE 2022

Welcome to another WTF winter where the nights are long and frequently clear enough for some worthwhile stargazing.

The sun has now almost reached its northernmost declination and for us that means it does not rise until after 7am and is gone again at ten past five leaving us in darkness by 5:30pm.

This fortnight the moon waxes through Gemini and Cancer to a First Quarter in Leo on Tuesday 7th, then through Virgo, Libra and Scorpius to be full in Ophiuchus on the following Tuesday 14th.

Mercury will climb the morning sky over this fortnight and will be at its best by Friday the 16th. Venus and Uranus will be in conjunction on Saturday 11th.

The evening sky now takes on its typical winter pattern, with

Orion setting in the West and Scorpius rising in the East. By 8pm the centre of the Milky Way is dominating the sky and the Emu can be easily identified.

Leo sits high in the sky to the North and bright red Arcturus dominates the Northeast. The bright star between Arcturus and the Southern Cross is Spica which represents the spike of wheat in Virgo's hand.

By midnight Saturn is well and truly up. The rest of the visible

planets are still strictly an early pre-dawn show. Jupiter and Mars are still close together. No meteor showers are currently active.

Keep an eye on the WTF Facebook page. I'll be trying to keep you updated on satellites and space stations when they become visible over Merredin. Why not take some pictures of the sky and post them there? We all would all love to see them. Until then - keep looking up!


