

#### **Court Report**

#### **14 November 2022**

#### **Northam Courthouse**

Jonathan Papertalk appeared on the charge of unlawfully assault and thereby did bodily harm with circumstances of aggravation. He was remanded to appear in Merredin on 30th November 2022.

#### 15 November 2022

#### **Central Law Courts**

Benjamin Pawlow appeared on charges of damaging property and threatened to kill. He was remanded to appear in Perth on 28th November 2022.

#### 21 November 2022

#### **Northam Courthouse**

Daniel Horan appeared on charges of breach of protective bail conditions, possessed drug paraphernalia in or on which there was a prohibited drug or plant, possess a prohibited drug or plant, possess a prohibited drug (Methylamphetamine), two counts of breached a family violence restraining order and two counts of without lawful excuse trespassed on a place. He was remanded to appear in Northam on 24 January 2023.

#### 5 January 2023

#### **Merredin Courthouse**

Joshua Travell appeared on the charge of Bac. Exceeds .000. He was remanded to appear in Midland on 28 February 2023.

Monalisa Takiabu appeared on the charges of careless driving, exceed speed limit between 20 and 29km/h and two counts of no authority to drive (never held). They were remanded to appear in Kalgoorlie on 12 January 2023.

Trephina Te Rito appeared on the charges of exceed speed limit between 20 and 29km/h, no authority to drive (disqualified from holding or obtaining) and provided false or misleading personal details. They were remanded to appear in Rockingham on 6 February 2023.

Keith Roberts appeared on the charges of possess a prohibited drug (Methylamphetamine) and possessed drug paraphernalia in or on which there was a prohibited drug or plant. He was remanded to appear in Merredin on 1 February 2023.

#### **SURVIVING TRAUMA**

Born on Christmas Eve 1958 in the back seat of a car, on Cronulla Street, Cronulla, Sydney, enroute to the Sutherland Distract Hospital. I was 8 weeks premature, two and half pounds with a hole in my heart, respiratory failure, and a double hernia. I spent the first few months in a humidicrib.

I headlined a Sydney newspaper as a "miracle baby". That was the first of four near fatal events.

Trauma is a result of an event or circumstances sometimes out of our control, which may have life long effects on the victims. The most impact on victims may vary dramatically, depending on the severity of the event, the follow up treatment, past experiences, upbringing, lifestyle, financial situation, mental health, and the list of factors go on.

Some people seek counselling while others seek self help treatments such as alcohol, drugs, time out of work and other activities, isolation which may, in some cases, be more harmful in the long term.

There are a variety of events which may become traumatic for victims such as motor vehicle accidents, the death of a family member or friend, suicide, domestic violence, breaking down of marriages/partnerships, and family.

In my case a near fatal motor vehicle accident in 1991, which resulted in injuries with the severity to have life long, life changing outcomes. As a "Driving Tired" shift worker enroute to work for an afternoon shift, I allegedly fell asleep behind the wheel, also known as a microsleep, and took out a lamp post head on.

I woke in Royal Perth Hospital 10 days later. I had multiple head injuries including blindness in one eye, along with other and internal injuries. A social worker visited me in the ward

and concluded my progress was good and did not require further counselling.

My Thoughts

Two years and nine reconstruction surgeries later, followed by other complications arising from the accident a few years later requiring more surgery.


It had a huge impact on my sons, family, friends, and myself. A lot of after effects are not obvious for some time but many years later. I turned to alcohol as self-medication and a few years off work once all surgeries were completed.

P.T.S.D. is a treatable condition, but for a lot of people, it can last a lifetime. There are people who never recover from traumatic events who spend a lifetime in and out of institutions or in worst case scenario's, become permanently institutionalized.

It's been almost 32 years since my accident. There constant reminders, such as the recent Kondinin family accident, driving tired commercials, as well as my road presentations which was created as a high impact warning for all road users about the consequences of "Driving Tired".

Traumatic events can be overcome with the right treatment, support from family and friends and a lot of healing time. For me, I am working, driving, remarried, travelled the world and living as normal a lifestyle as possible. All of this, since after the accident.

"There is life after Traumatic events."

#### From the History Room

The following snippets appeared in the local JANUARY newspapers of the time.

19th, 1933: Advertisement for Central Toilet Coy. For all medical rubber goods. Our booklet of information and prices posted under plain sealed cover.

7th, 1937: A serious fire at Bruce Rock this morning totally destroyed the premises of Mr. D. Redfern, saddler, Lonsdale's Buildings and the vacant shop recently occupied by Mettam's Agency. The Commonwealth Bank was in danger, but willing workers prevented the fire getting there.

15th, 1942: To make milk deliveries easier, clients are requested to place their jugs or billies on the front verandah or fence to save time due to shortage of labour.

27th, 1949: Prune Spread. Soak 1lb prunes then stew till tender in a little water. Drain well, press through a sieve. Mix in 2/3rds tablespoon of cake crumbs, tsp. of mixed spice and a squeeze of lemon. Place in jar.

27th, 1949: Last Saturday, residents in Merredin had the opportunity to inspect the new Australian made motor car, the Holden.

26th, 1950: Something unique in the history of Merredin will be a display by a flight of Mustang aircraft which will carry out formation flying during the Labour Day Jubilee Sports.

19th, 1966: Peter's Ice Cream (WA) Ltd. began operations at a new distribution centre in Bates Street on Monday. Mr. Dennis Murphy, a Merredin builder, built the cream brick building.

22nd, 1969: Vacation swimming classes at Merredin attracted a record enrolment this year, 454 being coached as against 417 in 1968.

14th, 1970: Merredin Police will have its new breath analysing set within a few days.

Disaster was averted when his mascara-wielding neighbour steadied the impending cascade, allowing him to regain control and reign in his equipment, so it once again became a LAPtop.

Disembarking, or more specifically, de-training onto the station platform at Perth, there was slight weaving and some mild seasickness, but that passed too quickly to take the day off, especially as that would mean catching another train!

#### **WATCHING THE FIRMAMENT 12TH-25TH JANUARY 2023**

Welcome back to Watching The Firmament for 2023, where Wheatbelt Telescope Fun is still the name of the game.

I'll be doing my best to help you understand what's going on up there when you lie back in your outdoor recliner on a cool summer evening and take in the vast beauty of Space.

I'll be trying to tempt you into staying up later to catch a glimpse of after-midnight celestial action, and I'll even try to convince you that getting up before dawn is visually well worth the effort.

2023 promises to be a fantastic astronomical year for West Australians, with a once-in-a-lifetime Total Solar Eclipse in April, and the development of the Square Kilometre Array gathering pace.

Astrotourism opportunities here in the Wheatbelt are coming more and more to the forefront as people become more aware of the world-class beauty of our dark dark night skies.

This fortnight is your last chance to see Saturn for about six months as it begins to approach the sun.

Venus is getting conspicuous in

the evening twilight. On the 23rd and 24th the crescent Moon, Venus and Saturn will make a very attractive conjunction low in the West after sunset.

Mars now dominates the Northern sky near the Pleiades. The sun is steadily becoming more active as sunspot cycle 25 gathers momentum.

The Xmas break saw a couple of X-class flares and the there was a little radio chaos as the resulting X-rays charged up the ionosphere. Commercial services dread these outbursts, but amateurs love the

unpredictable contact opportunities and will spend all night chasing them. Expect more of it.

Watch the Bureau of Meteorology Aurora webpage for the chance to capture some colours in the Southern sky.

Better still, why not join the WTF Facebook group? I try to keep the page updated with news and predictions, and it's a great place to share your pictures of the sky. Don't be shy. No matter how awful you think your photography is, someone will love your effort. Keep looking up!





There is a newspaper article stating that Mrs Duff held a party on the balcony of the hotel, in 1907. Unfortunately, the hotel was pulled down around 1970.


There are so many differing

#### Celebrating 130 Years of the Rail Reaching Merredin

2023 has arrived and what a big year it promises to be!

In 1893 the railway reached Merredin when two narrow gauge steel rails were laid where the town now stands. Yes, 130 years ago the face of the bush town changed forever, hastened by the activities of the gold discoveries at Southern Cross, Coolgardie and Kalgoorlie. To the aboriginal people, their way of life and access to their traditional lands would never be the same.


A rail centre was established in Merredin because of the availability of fresh water, obtained by the construction of a rock wall around Merredin Peak, channelling the water into the railway dam. From 1893 onwards water was pumped to

the railway yards and the tank on the stand. The tank bears an advertisement for "Kalgoorlie Bitter", a beer that was brewed in the Merredin Brewery. Merredin became an important junction for branch lines running north and south of the main east-west yards.

This year we are looking to celebrate the arrival of the rail to Merredin in different ways: none the least in continuing to provide a welcoming experience for our guests who call in to say "Hello!".

We invite the community to relive the former days of rail glory and witness the displays and artifacts that are on show. We invite you to tell us of your experiences with the railway in Merredin over the years.



#### **Positive and Active Mentoring**

Being a male is a matter of birth, being a man is a matter of age but being a positive and active mentor is a matter of choice, he didn't tell me, he showed me.

Wisdom can only be obtained through personal growth, ageing and the experiences we have in life. To me this means we can have a mature young man but not a wise one. I think this interpretation is important because it substantiates the vital role a positive and active mentor can play for us no matter what our age.

Who are our mentors? They can come from a pool of people, but are predominantly sourced from the following areas:

- someone older;
- for a bloke, dads are our first choice (92%). This is

interesting because society's demographics are changing. Research tells us that in 1960 10% of all kids were living away from their dads whereas by 2010 this had grown to 27% of all kids living away from their dads. This is a significant shift and one that puts additional pressure on the vital role of male mentoring;

 father figures, grandfathers, uncles, brothers, teachers or sporting coaches;

it can be someone who is not in your field of work or play, this can help gain a natural and external viewpoint.

When we are deciding what to do in life (whether it is day to day stuff or longer-term), talking to a mentor can help us with our decision making. This is important both in our personal life and our working and business careers.

A positive and active mentor:

- not only listens to what you're saying, but asks open ended and reflective questions;
- has opinions which you respect but acknowledges that you don't have to act on or agree with them;
- gives wisdom and perspective (lived experience);
- acts as a sounding board and confidant.

When making major decisions, talking through issues with a mentor is beneficial. Young blokes especially need to tell their stories to mentors. It is by this process that they can validate and question where they are at and where they are heading in life. It helps them to clarify their issues, thus cultivating independent thinking.

There is never a time in a man's life that he won't benefit from

having a positive and active mentor. Mentoring is about developing relationships, it takes time and sacrifice, it's a two-way street and everyone benefits. Blokes often have three types of people (mates) that we can spill our guts to. These usually come from the following categories:

- a peer;
- a partner;
- a mentor.

As blokes we need to identify who these people are. Ask yourself the question who is my mentor? This person may change through our life journey but remember positive mentoring is rewarding and being an active mentor is our choice.

#### **BE SKIN AWARE THIS SUMMER**



#### MEDIA RELEASE - CANCER COUNCIL WA

Cancer Council WA is encouraging adults in the Wheatbelt region to familiarise themselves with the common symptoms of skin cancer, with he majority (55-70%) of melanomas detected by themselves or their partners.

It is important to know your skin and what is normal for you, particularly if you are over 40 years of age. Skin cancers (including melanoma) accounts for the largest number of cancers diagnosed in Australia each year. Our latest data reveals that in 2019, 1587 people in WA were diagnosed with melanoma and sadly 145 people died from it.

We know people living in regional Australia have lower rates of five-year survival, compared with people living in cities, so we urge anyone in the Wheatbelt experiencing a skin cancer symptom to visit their doctor, clinic nurse or Aboriginal health worker.

Common symptoms of skin cancer include:

- A new spot or mole on your skin
- A spot that is different from other spots on your skin
- Any crusty or non-healing sores
- Any spots, freckles or any moles changing in size (width), thickness (height), colour, or shape over a perio of weeks to months.

It doesn't mean you've got skin cancer - often it turns out to be something less serious. But it is important to get checked. Getting our symptoms checked out an treated early means we can get back to the people we love and the things we love doing.
