PAINT PARTIES' PERMANENT NEW HOME!

Paint Parties now have a permanent new home!

Three years ago almost to the day, I held my first ever Paint Party (known back then as "Arty Farty Parties") in Merredin. It began as we came out of COVID lockdown in 2020, as an excuse for all of us who had spent months all but confined to our homes to get out and about and mingle again.

That first event sold out in less than 24 hours. Due to the popularity of the event, we expanded to 2 events in a weekend, and then 3. We opened up family classes in addition to the adults only classes. I started taking the Paint Parties outside of

Merredin - to date, my Paint Parties have been Burracoppin, Muntadgin, Kellerberrin, Bruce Rock, Westonia. Southern Cross. Hyden and Dowerin. This year I added craft classes to the Paint Parties, where we've so far made polymer clay jewellery, alcohol ink plant pots and hand woven baskets.

And last weekend, I took the massive step of opening the doors to a permanent workshop space on Barrack Street.

The opening weekend Launch Party started with a polymer clay jewellery making class on Friday night. We hand coloured polymer clay, and then layered it with silver leaf to imitate a stylised wood grain look.

On Saturday morning the doors were thrown open (metaphorically — it was too blimmin' cold to actually throw them open!) for anyone to come in and have a look, and children were able to decorate plaster figurines with paint and glitter.

Saturday evening saw the return of the super popular alcohol ink pot painting classes. A number of attendees had planned the class as part of a "Girls' Night Out", rolling on to the pub afterwards — it was really fun to be part of that!



My Thoughts

WHOSE THOUGHTS?

What makes us human? there a faculty unique to our species that sets us above the rest of Earth's organisms in terms of influence, adaptability, and dominion over them? Our ability to co-operate enterprises with rapid planetary consequences seems unmatched. What sets us so far apart from the rest of the biosphere? Many animals have sensory powers way beyond those of humans.

dog seems capable of telepathy when hunting, anticipating the behaviour of the rest of the pack as they seem to silently round up the prey as a single co-ordinated Crows appear to unit. understand the laws of physics they casually sidestep speeding cars and deploy tools to get what they want. So, what do humans have that the rest don't?

I would say it is our sense of symbolism, when one thing references another completely different thing. The ability to recognise and interpret symbols begins in our second year when infants begin to use sounds to indicate objects, actions and ideas with increasing precision. By the third year we have begun to deploy visual symbols to represent sounds. Toddlers begin to understand metaphors, abstractions, parables, and mathematics.

Children as young as six have mastered computer programming. This innate sense of symbolism I believe is the foundation upon which our epistemic world is built. More than anything it enables profound introspection, the ability to watch ourselves watching ourselves as we watch ourselves operating.

As such we have developed the science of neurology, and learnt about things like dopamine, serotonin, reward pathways and reflex speed.

Computers are the machines we build to interpret and process more and more symbols faster than our biology permits. As our knowledge of the physics of miniaturisation improves, so the density and therefore the

capabilities of these computers also improve.

This assistance becomes selfpropagating, and so we have the phenomenon of "machine learning", ML. Examples are everywhere. **Auto-focusing** cameras have been around since the 1980s. Mobile "devices" and social media have raised ML to a whole new level. Computer programs that constantly monitor our behaviour and adapt their output are now commonplace. "Recommenders" are engines that drive Facebook, TikTok and the rest of the interactive cyberspace.

Advertisers pay for favourable "recommendations". The next level up from ML is "artificial intelligence", Al. This is where the machine itself is permitted to supervise its own learning. How many of you have been impressed by the general knowledge and problem-solving abilities of Chat GPT? How many times do you think you have been fooled by extraordinary stunts on an Instagram reel?





Every day I see friends and acquaintances reacting emotionally to internet fakery as if it were real. These deep fakes are getting more and more difficult to detect. Did I write this article you are reading now, or did I ask Chat GPT to compose it? The worry is that as autonomous decision-making systems become larger, they may develop novel problemsolving algorithms that we might find undesirable, dishonest or overbearing.

Computers already do much more than just compute. They have already been handed control of much of our communication and energy networks. Infrastructure upon which we increasingly rely for our day-to-day survival.

How long before we hear a critical system telling us, "I'm sorry, Dave, I'm afraid I can't do that".

WINTER RECIPE

1st of June marked the start of winter for 2023. Whilst the outdoors may be chilly, you don't have to be!

Enjoy this warm winter recipe to keep your kitchen smelling amazing and your stomach full!

Hearty Chicken and Vegetable Soup

20 minutes prep 1hr15m cook 6 servings

Ingredients:

- 2 tbsp olive oil
- 1 leek, halved, washed, thinly sliced
- 2 garlic cloves, crushed
- 1 large carrot, peeled, diced
- 2 celery sticks, diced
- 2 small zucchini, diced
- 1 swede or turnip, peeled, diced
- 1 1/4 cups dry soup mix, rinsed (see note*)

- 8 cups Massel chicken style liquid stock
- 1kg skinless chicken lovely legs

Method:

- 1. Heat oil in a large saucepan over medium heat. A leek and garlic. Cook, stirring, for 2 minutes or until soft but not coloured. Add carrot, celery, zucchini, and swede. Cook for 2 minutes. Stir in soup mix, stock, chicken and 1 cup cold water. Increase heat to high an bring to boil.
- Reduce heat to low. Simmer, partially covered, stirring occasionally, for 1 hour or until soup mix and vegetables are tender.
- Remove chicken legs from soup. Allow to cool slightly. Remove meat from bones. Roughly chop chicken meat and add to soup. Season with salt an pepper. Ladle soup into warmed bows. Serve.
- *Packet dry soup mix is a combination of spilt peas and lentils.

AGED CARE TASKFORCE: GREAT EXPECTATIONS

NATIONAL SENIORS AUSTRALIA MEDIA RELEASE

National Seniors Australia welcomes the terms of reference and the announcement of the members if the Aged Care Taskforce which includes former CEO of Seniors Australia National Professor John McCallum. The primary function of the taskforce is to review funding arrangements, including consumer contributions to aged care.

"National Seniors Australia called for an independent boy to examine funding in past budget submissions, so we hope this taskforce goes some way towards achieving this goal," said National Seniors Australia Chief Advocate, Ian Henschke.

"Whatever funding model is put forward must be fair, transparent, and efficient. Critically, no older person will be willing to contribute more unless they can be assured, they will receive better and higher quality care."

"There are rightly great expectations from today's announcement but also trepidation, and it will be up to government to put forward a credible and fair plan and be willing to engage in conversation community."

National Seniors welcomes the Ministers recognition dementia care is core to aged care with the majority of people in aged care living with dementia. We have long argued that dementia care must be a part of training. National Seniors looks forward to contributing to the development of the Ten-Year Dementia Action Plan. We also need action to address the deficiency in palliative care and end of life care.

"We welcome the Ministers recognition that the workplace shortage remains the biggest issue facing the sector. As National Seniors has said many times before, increased recruitment, better training and retention of workers are the keys to overall success," Mr Henschke said.

"While the recent 15% pay increase helps, government needs to do more to attract and retain workers. A dedicated mature age traineeship scheme, such as the one trialled in South Australia, will help attract more mature workers to the sector."


"The government must now consider our Let Pensioners Work proposal to reduce the income test taper rate for people in the care sector. This will make it more attractive to keep working past pension age and give care workers more income and savings in later life."

From the History Room

The following snippets appeared in the local JUNE newspapers of the time.

18th, 1913: The game of football is fast losing ground in our district and does not reflect credit to our club. Generally, on a Sunday, Merredin is as dead as the proverbial doornail.

4th, 1930: The new Merredin Courthouse was officially opened when Mr. F.M. Read, R.M. presided.

3rd, 1946: You must have your Identity Card and the Registration Form CR7 filled in when applying for your new Ration Book.

9th, 1968: At Nunyarri, about 100 miles from Roebourne, is located a little-known enterprise – mining for asbestos. The plant is capable of producing 50 tons each month.

16th, 1965: Western Australia is standing on the doorstep of a spectacular new era in telecommunications development, brought about by the provision of what are known as broadband systems.

26th, 1966: PUBLIC SERVICE NOTICE: National Service registrants turning 20 between January 1 and June 30 this year will be eligible for indefinite deferment of call-up if they were married on or before June 12.

29th, 1966: The new Babakin Primary School will be opened on July 8. For years teachers have had to put up with old fashioned windows, blackboards, open smokey fires and poor sanitation.

17th, 1970: Stan Lonsdale's Modern Meat Store recently closed in Bruce Rock after 60 years of business.

Tramain Ward appeared on the charges of breach of bail (fail to appear soon after), disorderly behaviour in public, assault public officer, obstructing public officer and being armed or pretending to b armed in a way that may cause fear. He was remanded to appear in Merredin on 5 July 2023.

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

Astronomy

WTF 15th —28th June2023

It's winter solstice time again, when the sun reaches its furthest point from us, on the Tropic of Cancer, and turns for home. The exact moment this year will be Thursday the 22nd at 10:57am.

It's difficult to detect this from the tables because the Equation of Time causes the sun to also move sideways at this time of year. Because the earth's axis of rotation is tilted by 23.4 degrees to its axis of orbit, a sideways pulsing effect occurs similar to that of a driveshaft universal joint. Combined with the fact that earths orbit is an ellipse not a circle, this means the noonday sun describes a

figure-8 pattern in the sky, and the top and bottom of the 8, where sideways movement is greatest, occurs at the June and December solstices. This is called the Analemma, or equation of time.

A new Moon this fortnight means dark evenings can be expected. The thin crescent will look attractive setting in the early evening near Mars and the Beehive cluster in Cancer.

Jupiter now dominates the eastern sky before dawn. Saturn will be found almost directly overhead before sunrise. A few meteors should be around as well in the mornings.

The June Bootids radiate from the North and are typically just one or two per hour, however they are caused by a very short period comet and some years they go berserk. 1989 was the last time. Might be due for a flare up again...

Speaking of flare-ups, Betelgeuse is in the news again, having recovered from it's recent dimming to be now 50% brighter than usual. extreme fluctuations have inflamed the supernova excitement even more, and at just 600-odd light-years away such a detonation would be the phenomenon of the century. Although it is now almost completely a daytime object a

Betelgeuse supernova would be easily visible at noon, rivalling the moon for brightness.

By the time Orion resumes its domination of the night sky next summer it would be a dazzling spectacle, but don't raise your hopes too much. Eta Carina began an eruption in the mid nineteenth century that was expected to become a supernova, and still is today.

But the scale of the universe is such that a hundred trillion miles is considered nearby, and a thousand years is equivalent to the blink of an eye. Keep looking up. You can see the infinite.

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
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THE BATTLE RAGES ON MANY FRONTS!


