

# AEC WARNS VOTERS ABOUT POSTAL VOTE APPLICATIONS

The Australian Electoral Commission (AEC) is calling on voters to go straight to the AEC for postal vote applications and to ignore the mailouts from some candidates and their political parties.

Australian political parties are reaching out with postal vote registration forms ahead of election day, may be just as interested in your personal data as helping you cast a ballot.

Political parties are exempt from privacy laws and can send out various pieces of information to people in their electorates including postal vote applications.


It's a method of voting that is expected to explode in popularity this election as constituents seek to avoid crowded polling stations in response to the COVID-19 pandemic.

However, these postal vote notices didn't originate from the Australian Electoral Commission (AEC), they are sent by political parties which are continuing a long tradition of trying to direct postal vote applications through their offices.

While the practice has always made some voters uneasy, privacy experts have voiced concerns over the new direction it has taken in this election campaign.

# **ABUSE**

No need for it. Yet it happens in all different forms, and it is not talked about as much as it should be. One should not be afraid to speak out because they fear the consequences they may face. All ages experience abuse and yet we don't learn about it until it's happening to someone we love or even ourselves. Being abused can be from anyone, even small things can be called abuse.

At least once a day you see at least one thing on abuse on social media. How can someone be so mean to another person, to the point that they try and hide the abuse from other people?

A lot of the time an abuser has been abused themselves, so they think it's normal because they grew up with it. Abusers seem to suck the life out of people in one way or another. They don't think they are doing anything wrong let alone think they'll get accused and caught.

Some abuse can be seen worse than other abuse, but in the end, abuse is still abuse.

Personally, I have experienced a form of abuse and at the young age, and I wasn't aware it was abuse. I was abused by someone close to me for several years and it wasn't until I was moved away that it stopped.

Being a child, I acted up and always wanted attention. When I wasn't getting the attention, I started looking for different ways of getting attention. I was an easy target for abuse. The abuse was addicting. I didn't

understand the trauma it would cause or the impact it would have on my life.

It was about ten years after the abuse I was able to speak up. I had gotten to a point where I was able to tell people. I was so afraid it was starting to affect me mentally. Telling the people around the abuser was hard, I lost half of my family and friends.

Going through stages of anger and hurt was a common thing. Having to rewire my brain to start believing I was more than the abuse was hard and something I'll continue working on. As an adult I am very cautious of people around me and how they treat not only me but other people. I've learned from my abuse and grew into someone I wish I had around when I was younger. It has made me more aware.

A lot of people struggle with moving on from the abuse. Whenever I get asked how I don't let it affect me, I don't have an answer.

One thing I can say is there are so many people living with abuse everyday as well as people dealing with abuse from the past, so don't be scared to speak up and ask for help. There is always someone willing to listen and willing to help. You are not alone. Someone would rather listen to your story than attend your funeral.

# **NEWS FROM THE COMMUNITY GARDEN**

Autumn at last! Gardeners are feeling the urge to get into the garden - planting, pruning and weeding, or planning new landscaping. At the Community Garden in Bates Street, activities have moved on from the interminable summer watering.

The Garden currently contains a variety of fruit trees (including olive, mulberry, quince, fig, pomegranate and varieties of citrus), vegetables (including egg plant, pumpkin, celery, tomato, sweet potato, zucchini, squash, silver beet, capsicum rhubarb) and (parsley, basil, mint, rosemary, bunching and walking onions, chives, chili, tarragon, lemon grass, as well as varieties of mint). There are also grape vines, various ornamentals, native plants and succulents.

Visitors are welcome. Saturday afternoon is a good time to visit, or at other times if you see someone there. You might gain some inspiration for your own garden or pick what you need from the Community Garden. If you join us, for \$10/year, your conscience will be clear when you pick some vegies or herbs, but more importantly your financial support will help the Garden. Members are under no obligation to work in the garden or attend meetings.

What we will plant out in the coming months: broccoli,

cauliflower, cabbage, garlic, beetroot, carrots, turnips, parsnips, peas, broad beans and a variety of salad lettuce.

Available now for harvest: tomato, zucchini, squash, celery, chili, cucumber, egg plant, silver beet and rock melon.

Available soon for harvest: sweet potato and pumpkins.

Garden thoughts from members:

"This Gillian Ovans: past summer was the hottest and driest I have experienced since moving to Merredin about four years ago, after a winter that brought heavier frosts. Most plants in the community garden did struggle, but we only lost a few. With the change of season and autumn rains we are now receiving, the garden recovering well.



It has been three years since the present group of volunteers have been caring for the community garden. We are learning all the time about what grows well, where, and what plants we just must give up on because they take too much time and effort to look after. We have had some successes which encourage us to keep going.

Of all the weeds we deal with at the Community Garden, caltrop has been the worst. Each week we do a quick walk around and dig it up because caltrop sets seed within a very short time of appearing. Wear gloves and check your shoes before moving to another area!"

Roy Butler: "Don't be too hasty with hoe or poison. When new plants (not including recognisable weeds) appear in the garden, let them grow until they are identifiable. I have gained some interesting, free native plants by leaving newly germinated seedlings to grow until I can identify them."

# **Tales from the Rails**

As this is the edition prior to Anzac Day, we pay tribute to the history of the railway workers and their support of the West Australian war effort through their employ with the WAGR. The following excerpts are taken from Philippa Rogers " Troops Trains and Trades" (1999, Success Press). This Anzac Day we acknowledge the war service and thank those veterans who currently reside in Merredin as well as those for whom Merredin was once home. This article is a mixture of facts and anecdotes.

The rail network of the Western Australian Government Railways (WAGR) was at its peak on June 30 1939 in terms of the of length of lines served. Main lines totalling 4377 miles 59 chns (approx. 7000kms) and sidings 503 miles 60 chns (approx 800kms). Railways were the main carriers of people and freight and in that year ran 6,721,453 miles (10.8 million train kilometres) which was the maximum attained. Bus private car transport and ownership had increased resulting in declining patronage. Rising operational costs and a poor harvest had resulted in the cancellation of some country trains. The railways were under pressure before the onset of the war. (Page 7)

By the 1930s much of the WAGR's equipment was outdated and had not been replaced due to Depression imposed restrictions. Half the locomotives in service dated back to the before the turn of the century.

The first troop train to Northam from Perth was hauled by PR locomotive "Frankland" with Jack Tobin as the Driver and Don McCracken the Fireman. (Page 11)

After the first quota of 2<sup>nd</sup> AIF recruits left Perth for Northam,

WAGR Driver Jack Tobin told his son Trevor, that after this train departed from Chidlow there were hardly any glasses to be found in the Refreshment Room or at the local hotel. As a result, later troop trains were scheduled to run through Chidlow and "army refreshments" were set up at Koojedda. (12)

Reg Lewis commented that on his return to Perth from Naval service training in the eastern states, the first stop west of Kalgoorlie was Bullabulling (eighteen miles west of Coolgardie). Water was taken on and the Driver gave a few blasts on the whistle to get the lads out of the nearby hotel. (Page 18)

If a funeral was scheduled the Funeral Director would contact the staff at the railway station, mention to time and ensure the cortege would be able to cross the line without any interruption by a train. However, on one occasion an east bound troop special was running at express passenger speed and the driver Sam Inglis, recalled that just as he topped the rise west of the town, he saw to his horror, a funeral procession crossing the line. Having sounded the whistle and made heavy brake application, probably forcing the troops (on board) to a standing position undertaker, priest, pallbearers and casket made it over the tracks, with the balance of the cortege stopping in time before the train swept through.

Provisions were made in 1943 to train six field engineers in the work of locomotive driving so they could carry out this work in the Middle East. Theory classes were easily organised but there was concern from both the Civil

Mechanical Engineer and the WA Locomotive and Engine Drivers, Firemen and Cleaners' Union regarding the practical. It was indicated the practical could take years. Three serviceman qualified. (Page 114).

The threat of Air Raids was always present. The US Army was concerned about the possibility of derailments and the resulting loss of time. In response to this the WAGR identified breakdown equipment available. The main breakdown

train had been moved to Merredin from East Perth and comprised of a steam crane, U wagon, V vans, Vc van (with bunks for twelve men) and a Z class brakevan. (Page 121)

In common with the wider population, the railways had to submit to wartime restrictions with blackouts, the removal of station names boards and the unavailability of maps. To assist the travelling public, railway staff were required to call out station names. (Page 121)

Many people were able to have a look in the Hall and check out the mammoth task that lays ahead to return this proud building back to its original



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

# WHEN CONTRACTS ARE UNFAIR

very time you buy a product, book a holiday, top-up your phone credit or hire a tradesperson, you are entering into a legally binding agreement that comes with its own terms and conditions.

Sometimes you may have the chance to negotiate before you agree, however it is more common for consumers to be offered a 'standard form contract', which is the same as those offered to everyone else on a 'take it or leave it' basis.

If one of the terms seems unreasonable, then it's worth knowing that the Australian Consumer Law protects consumers from standard form agreements that would result in a significant imbalance of rights between the business and consumer.

Just recently, the Supreme Court ordered a Western Australian landlord to stop using short-stay accommodation contracts containing contract terms that were weighted strongly in his favour and left the renters facing considerable detriment.

Some of the unfair terms included non-refundable deposits, rent and bonds if bookings were cancelled at any time; forfeiture of the bond and rent in advance if other people

stayed in the accommodation; and credit card authority to deduct repair and cleaning costs in excess of the retained bond.

The Supreme Court effectively struck out those unfair clauses in the contracts and ordered him to pay costs of \$5,000, plus \$1,500 to one of his renters left out of pocket.

In the wake of this outcome, we're urging holiday and shortstay accommodation providers to review their current contracts to ensure they are fair and balanced.

While a final decision on whether contract terms are unfair can only be reached by a court, the following questions may potentially help consumers

to identify one:

Does it cause a significant difference between your rights and obligations and those of the business?

Is it really necessary to protect the interests of the business?

Would it cause you a detriment if the business tried to enforce it?

How transparent is the term? Do you understand what it means and the impact on you if it was enforced?

# MORE ROAD SAFETY INVESTMENT IN DURACK

Residents of the Durack electorate received a major road safety boost today with the Australian Government announcing it will invest \$2.4 million toward three new projects under the 2022-23 Black Spot Program.

The Black spot Program funds safety measures such as traffic signals and roundabouts at locations where a number of serious crashes are known to have occurred or are at risk of occurring.

Federal Member for Durack, the Hon. Melissa Price said community input was critical to identifying key black spots in the electorate.

"Road crashes place major emotional strain on all affected communities but particularly the families and friends of the victims, I am pleased to see that these worthy projects have received the funding they require to make driving in Durack safer," she said.

The Durack projects in this round of the 2022-23 Black Spot Program include:

- Toodyay Julimar Road, \$711,000
- Karratha DeWitt Road Coolawanyah Road, \$900,000
- Dowerin-Dowerin-Meckering Road, \$801,922

"Motorists living within and visiting these regions in Durack will be pleased to know these notorious black spots in the electorate will be fixed with funding from the program. None of these projects would be delivered without the community's vital input and I encourage all residents and motorists in the region to nominate projects for future funding rounds, " Ms Price said.

This funding is part of the Government's \$1.3 billion commitment to the Black spot Program from 2013-14 to 2025 -26 to improve road safety across the nation."

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# **CARER'S CORNER**

Due to the long weekends, the April Carers 'get together' will not take place.

Aged Care, NDIS services within the community and carer fatigue along with other issues that come with caring for someone are very important and with no Advocacy Group here, it is difficult for carers to absorb all the government information.

The Federal Government provides for the NDIS and HCP, and the State Government provides for the Healthcare system and while this can provide some welfare assistance within the Healthcare system, it is generally not the role of the Hospital to get involved with community care other than HACC (Home and Community Care).

HACC which is a state funded initiative, I believe, is limited in its application and this is where the system fails as there are no representatives to explain, promote or assist people, who in so many cases, don't have the technical knowledge or skills to go to the internet to find out what is available. There appears little information in the Doctors surgeries or promotion by Doctors, because this is not part of their role.

So, I am hoping I can shed a little light on the matter of what to do and where to go for the help you may need.

- 1. Talk to your GP and request a referral for an ACAT assessment (Aged Care Assistance Team);
- 2. Ask your GP for a Patient Health Summary, this will give you details of your health record to refer back to and helps you recall your medical conditions when the ACAT assessment is carried out;
- 3. At the ACAT assessment you will be asked many questions about issues affecting your ability to do all the everyday tasks that are needed to stay living comfortably in your own home; and
- 4. There are four levels of Home Care steps, starting at level 1, through to level 4 as life skills diminish. (See table below.)

These rates apply to the payment for services you may require like in home help, gardening or mobility aids. The

funds are provided monthly to a provider, who provides the services you require, or purchases mobility aids on OT or Medical recommendations.

I am not overly familiar with the NDIS but understand that an allowance is allocated annually to provide for the services required and these services are accessed through service providers. There is a waiting list and it is recommended that you have a conversation with your GP if you are in a situation where your ability to live comfortably at home restricted due to health or other issues. Another good place for advice is through the Carers Gateway, they are able to provide some help in the case of emergencies.

I am in the process of doing a Trial for an Adult Day Care and Respite Centre. The simple thinking behind this is, if I would like to go to the hairdressers, without Mike sitting outside in the car, or I might want to have

a coffee with friends and not have to take him, (he is often the only man in a group of ladies, and it would be a nice change to not be responsible for every minute of every day for him).

Over an 8 week term, a volunteer group has been meeting at the Senior Centre in Merredin to gauge the response to the possible establishment of an Emergency Care and Day Care Facility to cater for residents within the region. The Trial is conducted on Friday mornings from 10am till noon at the Senior Centre and has been a little challenging with illness and other issues cropping up to keep a consistent Trial.

## **SCHOOL CAMPS BACK ON IN TERM 2**

Education and Training Minister Sue Ellery has announced today that school camps can recommence from the beginning of Term 2 (Tuesday April 26), based on the latest health advice.

School camps were postponed or cancelled under the high COVID-19 caseload settings introduced on advice from the Chief Health Officer on February 8, 2022, to keep schools and childcare settings operating safely.

Today's announcement is welcome news for school

communities, with camps being a highly valuable part of student education, skills building and wellbeing, and forming part of the curriculum in areas such as outdoor education, health and physical education, the arts, and leadership.

To support the safe return of school camps, the Department of Education has developed risk assessments and guidelines for schools to use which have been prepared based on advice from the Chief Health Officer. This includes the requirement for schools to be provided with a

copy of the camp provider's COVID-19 Safety Plan, which must meet the Guidelines for School Camp Providers prepared in accordance with the Chief Health Officer's advice.

School plans will require schools to provide Rapid Antigen Tests and make isolation arrangements for anyone that shows COVID-19-like symptoms, who tests positive or is identified as a close contact, as well as continue supporting regular hygiene practices, physically distancing where possible and cohorting student

groups.

On February 11, 2022, Minister Ellery announced a \$3 million assistance package for school camp providers directly impacted by schools postponing or cancelling camps due to the additional health measures in place. This assistance has been extended until May 6, 2022, to provide support while camps get back up and running.

A \$500,000 incentive fund is also available to provide opportunities for public school students to participate in day trips and incursions.

# **SONRISE SERVICE**







# WTF 21st APRIL - 4th MAY 2022

Welcome back Watchers of The Firmament. After such a miserable, rainy, cloudy Easter fortnight here's hoping we get a few nice evenings for stargazing.

How do they work out when Easter is? Put simply, Easter Sunday is the first Sunday after the first full moon after the Autumn Equinox, which now falls on March 22. But this gets complicated by religion, which has developed an incredibly

complex formula based on such arcane concepts as the "paschal computus" the "epact" and the "Metonic scale". Feel free to plug those terms into your favourite search engine for a truly bamboozling experience.

The confusion can be real, such as it was in 2019 when the astronomical and ecclesiastical dates did not align. The latest possible date for Easter is April 25, which last happened in 1943 and will next occur in 2038.

A March 22 Easter, the earliest possible date is very rare indeed, last occurring in 1818 and will not come up again until 2285.

From the tables it will be noticed that Mercury is at its greatest Eastern elongation this week, and may be captured low in the West after sunset, weather permitting.

Other evening features include the Emu, a huge lane of black gas that marks the central plane of the Milky Way. Crowned by the Southern Cross and wearing Alpha and Beta Centauri as a necklace it gradually rises higher and higher as winter approaches to reveal its body which encompasses the glorious cosmic jewellery of Galactic Central Point. Venus, Saturn and Mars are still close together in the pre-dawn, and Jupiter also becomes prominent in the morning twilight.

I'll be out there looking up waiting for every gap in those pesky clouds. Feel free to join me.







# **HELP FOR HOSPITALITY**

"PLASTIC FREE PLACES" Hospitality venues, including reusable items and alternatives to plastics. bars, restaurants,

cafes, markets and sporting arenas, are being offered help to transition to plastic free places ahead of the single-use plastics ban commencing on July 1, 2022.

The ban applies to the supply of plastic items single-use including straws and stirrers, cutlery, plates and bowls. Straws will continue to be available for people in the community who require them to meet their life needs. From October 1, 2022 Western Australian businesses can no longer supply disposable plastic cups for cold drinks.

To support businesses to make change alternatives, the McGowan Government is teaming with Boomerang Alliance, a not-forprofit organisation working on waste minimisation recycling. The alliance works with businesses' existing local suppliers to choose the best

It is estimated that since it formed in 2003, Boomerang Alliance has prevented the use of more than 10 million pieces of plastic throughout Australia.

Last year, the McGowan Government fast-tracked its nation-leading Plan for Plastics by up to four years, leading to a range of single-use plastics being phased out from January 1, 2022 and January 1, 2023.


